Asha Kiran Ashram

The school is once again its normal lively self. The staff - three special needs teachers and a full time physiotherapist, as well as helpers - are all highly skilled and committed. The number of children is increasing, and there is plenty of demand from other families. The intention is to build the roll up to 50 children, which will require more teachers.

At the official opening, we were also able to officially hand over various items that your generosity provided - callipers for Loganathan, and a specialist wheelchair for Thangarathnam, who has very severe cerebral palsy.

Our regular supporters will be familiar with Beulah, who was born without legs. We have provided prosthetic legs for her in the past, but she had outgrown her second set. Her third set have, for the first time, flexible knees and ankles - a big challenge, but one to which she is rising magnificently with her customary enthusiasm and determination. Please pray for her.



Santhosh's health is poor, so he is looking to transfer the work to Grace Ministries, a larger organisation. There are a lot of details to be worked out, but this would be a good way forward. Please pray that this can be done quickly and that it will work out well.

Plans for the future include a satellite special needs centre in a nearby town, training for carers, a home for adult disabled people who have no-one to look after them, and CCTV.

Happy Valley

Each day 37 to 40 children come to **Happy Valley** where they are looked after by 13 staff, including 4 special-needs teachers (one is a speech therapist), 1 craft person and a part-time physiotherapist. The children's ability to learn is often very limited, but with patience and persistence many of them are able to manage simple writing and reading in Malayalam and English, along with basic arithmetic. Physiotherapy and speech therapy are making all the difference to many children.



Vishnu (cerebral palsy) is now able to sit unaided in a normal chair, and can hold a cup on his own as a result of physiotherapy.

Plans for the future involve obtaining their own building. Philip is confident that he can get a plot of land by the end of the year; the challenge will then be to fund a suitable building. Building costs in Kerala are significantly higher than in Tamil Nadu, and have increased exponentially over the years. In addition, few building plots in the area are flat, so substantial earthworks will be needed before a large single-storey building can be constructed. It will probably have to be built in stages, much as Asha Kiran Ashram was. The advantages of this development will be permanence, stability, and eligibility for a substantial government grant.

Please pray that this will be successful. And please pray that the children at both Asha Kiran and Happy Valley will continue to develop to their full potential.

Medical Work

HHI's core medical help continues, as it has throughout the lockdown. Shibu has been working at the hospital throughout and, at the time of the visit, was looking after six patients who would not have been admitted were it not for him. Please pray for him, that his wonderful enthusiasm and compassion will continue.

Many people come to Philip or to Pastor Wilson seeking help. We do what we can. On our website we told the story of Babu, who needed two heart valves replaced; this would cost about £1600, but he had only been able to raise £1000. Thanks to your generosity we were able to send out £500, which was enough for the operation to go ahead.

There are many other people in a similar situation, and Pastor Wilson often tells us about them. One that we have been able to help recently is Suja Thankachan, a very poor woman. Glaucoma has damaged the nerves in her eyes, and she needed surgery to prevent further damage. This would cost around 40,000 Rupees [£420]. She was able to raise some money, but not enough. She came to Pastor Wilson and pleaded for support. We were able to send Rs. 28,000, enough for the operation to go ahead.

Another was Bhasurangi, a widow whose only son is unable to walk after a stroke, and who is on dialysis after kidney failure. Now Bhasurangi has mouth cancer. Thanks to your generosity, we were able to make a big contribution towards the cost of her operation.

Please pray for these people, that their operations will be successful.

Let There Be Light!!

Yes, it has finally happened!!! The new dining room at Nanga school has been equipped with solar panels. There is now lighting and power for computers and television within the dining hall. This means that it can now be used as an extra teaching and learning space in the evenings, and as a recreation facility on the weekends. The head teacher, Mr Bweupe, in his letter of appreciation to HHI, explained that the solar lighting will ensure that the risk of snake bites is reduced as the students have improved visibility at night. Literacy levels will also improve as special needs students can receive extra tuition.

We are so pleased that this final stage of the Nanga school improvement project has come to completion. We sincerely thank our Scottish supporters for raising the £10,000 for the panels and their installation. It will certainly improve the lives of residential disabled students and help them to feel that they have not been forgotten. We are really looking forward to visiting Nanga school in September and, all being well, we hope to add to their IT resources with some extra laptops. We give thanks for a successful outcome, and we pray that the solar panel system will bring smiles and joy for a long time to come.

It has inspired many people to support HHI, and, as a result, great things have been achieved, more than we or Ron Prosser ever imagined.

While preparing articles for this edition of Tidings, an email came directly from Dr Ibrahim of Monze Mission Hospital. He asks for help to buy a new autoclave machine for the hospital. Of the four machines which they have in the operating theatres, two are beyond repair and two are running on their last legs. They have tried all avenues possible to repair the machines but to no avail.

For those who are unsure of what an autoclave machine is, it provides a physical method for disinfection and sterilization. Autoclaves operate at high temperature and pressure to kill microorganisms and spores. Therefore, it is an essential piece of equipment to enable operations to be conducted safely.

A quote of £16,000 has been received by Dr Ibrahim for a replacement machine. This is a huge amount of money and more than we can manage at the moment but we live by faith. We have



provided other equipment in the past and we will continue to do what we can. Here are a few examples of the equipment we have already sent to Monze Mission Hospital:

His mother is a widow, and, due to Mark's constant hospitalisation, she couldn't continue to earn the little income from her vegetable stall in the market. Mark needed £100 to make the hospital trips to Lusaka with his mother. Last March we were notified of his plight, and because of your giving, we were able to send the money, and Mark received the necessary treatment. A few months later he came into the HHZ Monze office to say "thank you", and his smile brought joy to Brenda and the staff. On the same day, in the same office, Mrs Hango'mba sat with her grandson, Dunford, on her knee. She was not smiling. She also needs £100 to take her four-year-old grandson to Lusaka teaching hospital for medical assessment. Dunford's mother abandoned him when he was two. He has multiple disabilities and is malnourished. Can we bring a smile to Mrs Hango'mba's face? With prayer and your help, we are sure we can.


