Tidings



Asha Kiran Ashram

Earlier this year we paid for custom made desks and chairs for the children. These have now been constructed and delivered. They are strong, bright and colourful, and add greatly to the ambiance of the school. The main hall has also been tiled extensively, which will help keep it clean.

At mid-day mealtime each day the students sit crosslegged, if they are able to, and enjoy their meal, for instance of rice and egg curry. The food is cooked at a local government school and delivered to Asha Kiran Ashram each day for free. Some students need help to eat and the ayas (caretakers) are there to assist.

In November the District Differently Abled Welfare Officer (DDAWO) provided electronic tablets to the school, which are being utilized for educational purposes.

Then in December Asha Kiran Ashram celebrated World Disability Day at Sivaselam Deaf and Dumb School. Students participated in running and other sports activities and enjoyed snacks and lunch.

The year ended with a Christmas celebration. The program included sports activities, dancing, singing, dramas, and slogans. Students participated according to their abilities, and prizes were awarded.



Usually we hear about youngsters who are still at Asha Kiran, but sometimes a former pupil comes back. One such is Anthreya Devadoss, who returned to express his appreciation for all the help that he received in the past. He is now on a government-funded work scheme that enables him to earn a living wage.



One of the children with whom the school is working with is Jebin, a 13-year-old boy.

A variety of intensive training and physiotherapy exercises have proved very effective, enabling him to walk on both plain and uneven surfaces. He is also exhibiting improved hand coordination. Work continues to address continuing problems (talipes equinovarus and wrist contracture) but the progress so far has been very gratifying.

The centre continues to provide special needs education, physiotherapy, support, food and contact with their peers to a large number of children: on a typical day some 50 to 55 come, out of 64 on the roll, although at the time of religious festivals the numbers are lower.

The school took part in the International Disabled Day celebration conducted by Kerala's Social Justice Board and the District Panchayat (village council). The special children participated in the programme, winning several prizes ahead of the other 1846 special children.

At the end of the year a team of 12 of the more able bodied children took part in the Kerala State Special Olympics in Calicut. This is a big event, with about 5600 children participating. The team did very well, bringing home one gold medal, seven silver and 3 bronze.

One problem which the centre faces is that of climate change – many parents and local supporters are reliant on finding work each day, and during the increasingly unpredictable monsoon season this is in short supply. No income and no savings mean that there is no local support for the centre. So far Philip has been able to find some other sources of income, but it would be great if we were able to increase our contribution.

The lease on the present building comes to an end soon. Philip Mathew is searching for a suitable replacement – and has had useful discussions another Indian charity in the area which has a building for special needs children but no children. Please pray that this will be successful. He is also looking for a donation of land for a purpose built building, which remains our long term aim.

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Monthly medical needs



Each month we receive a very comprehensive report from the team in Zambia on how your money has been spent, detailing the benefits to individuals and projects and the needs which have arisen during the month. Every day parents or grandparents come asking for help for their disabled and sick dependants. Often they have been given referrals for specialised treatment in Lusaka and they can't afford the transport or the overnight stay while their children are being treated.

Matron is 18 years old, blind and epileptic. She cannot walk and needs to be carried on her mother's back! Mother has a small business selling tomatoes. Funds were given to boost the business and to provide a wheelchair for Matron.



Judith is 13 years old and is being cared for by her grandmother. Judith was born with normal vision, but a severe case of malaria has left her blind, and her eyes are constantly streaming. Grandmother has no income and asked HHZ for help to take Judith to the eye hospital in Lusaka. HHI managed to send funds to help both these sad cases and many more. We pray that all those who come seeking help will benefit from their treatment and that HHI can continue to give this important monthly medical support.

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Thanal House update

The ladies at Thanal house have a variety of psychiatric needs, and can be very unreliable. If they weren't supervised, often they would bring water from the main toilet / wash / shower area into the dormitory, spill it and make a right mess.

As a result their access to this had to be restricted to night time and first thing in the morning, when they could be watched. During the day time they had to use a far inferior area which looked like this – a right black hole! On our visit at the start of last year we discussed various ways of improving the situation, but we didn't have the money to pay for it, and neither did Salini at Thanal.





But then last year one of our supporters had received an inheritance and gave us some of it to improve the lot of women in India and Zambia. We divided it between the two countries, and could go ahead with rebuilding the day time facilities. The work is now complete, and it looks wonderful - a great improvement, as I'm sure that you will all agree!

And there is some money left over which we are using to increase the contribution that we make to the monthly running costs of Thanal. This will help them pay for medical help and a better diet for the women, and it is already making a huge difference to their well-being.

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So thank you so much to our supporter (you know who you are!).

Individual help



Often we report on the big things, but for many poor and sick people in India they may have to choose between buying the medicines they need and food. Even a small monthly donation can make all the difference.

One such is Sindhu, who has psoriasis. It can be controlled with pills, but where will the money for these come from? Her husband is disabled, and cannot do more than the most menial, poorly paid job. Just £10 a month makes all the difference.

Your donations support about 50 such people with contributions from £5 to £20 a month. Thank you for making all this possible!

Tailoring training giving new life skills for the disabled in Zambia





Mona, Abigial, Mainza and Florida are four young ladies who are currently being cared for in the HHZ compound while they receive their tailoring training from the excellent teacher and seamstress Alistair Mweete. Alistair has been a member of the HHZ team from its inception and she has had many successful students including Grace.

The current trainees are deaf and mute, and one is physically disabled in a wheelchair. Alistair can communicate well with them all and the reports from HHZ confirm they are making good progress. By the end of March, it is hoped that they will have graduated. £400 has been forwarded so that they will each have their own new sewing machine to continue their newfound skills and generate income when they return to their homes.

We pray that the students will be able to use their skills to support their future living. We give thanks for the donations received which have enabled HHI to fund their new machines.

Grace making a difference to fracture patients



Grace Mushiba receives monthly support from HHI. She is a competent seamstress thanks to Alistair's proficient training. As a result, Grace manages to support herself, her mother and her sister. Unfortunately, last year Grace had to be readmitted to Monze Mission Hospital to have some further amputations on both her legs to prevent infection spreading. Grace is totally dependent on her wheelchair for mobility. As mentioned in our previous edition of Tidings, there was some indication that Monze Mission

Hospital would appreciate her tailoring skills to make slings to assist fracture patients. We are delighted to inform you that this idea has come to fruition. Dr Katherine Kezen, a surgical doctor at Monze Mission Hospital visited Grace and paid her K1850 (about £50) to make the slings. Without the support of HHI through HHZ Grace would not be able to help others in need.

We give thanks to God for this wonderful outcome! A beautiful partnership between HHI, HHZ, Grace and Monze Mission Hospital.

All is well at Choongo School

2025 has started very well for the students at Choongo school now that the new dormitory is fully in use. Mr Muzila, the head teacher, has expressed his gratitude to HHI with a lovely letter of appreciation:



Thank you very much for this intervention and may God bless you and all those who have donated towards this project.




