Happy Valley - our special needs centre in Kerala

In the last *Tidings* we told you that the end of the lease on Happy Valley's building was imminent, and that Philip was searching for a replacement as the landlord refused to extend the lease. Unfortunately there are not many suitable buildings in the area, and the owners of anything available refused to rent them out for a school because they feared that the children would damage them. The end of the lease came, everything was packed up, and disaster loomed. Closure of this wonderful work seemed inevitable.

Then, at the last minute, the landlord relented. Happy Valley could stay on for a further year, but at a much increased rent. Disaster was averted and the centre has reopened after the long holiday (April and May in India). The lifechanging work of feeding, educating and training 68 children with a variety of special needs can continue – and is continuing. Everyone is very relieved.

However it is becoming increasingly clear that continuing to operate out of rented buildings is not a long-term option. A purpose-designed and purpose-built home for Happy Valley is the only long-term option. As a first step towards this goal we have agreed to help Philip buy a suitable plot of land which would cost about £50,000. Philip is confident that he and his team in India could raise about £20,000 if we could raise the rest.

Once we have the land it should be easier to raise the money needed for the building. Our long-term supporters may remember that this is what we did for Thanal House — we bought the land (land was a lot cheaper in those days!) and then Sam raised the money for the building. Most of the costs of developing the building since then have also been raised locally. Philip is confident that he can achieve something similar for Happy Valley.

Regular readers of *Tidings* will be familiar with Shibu's work. For many years he has worked tirelessly as a volunteer in Trivandrum Medical College Hospital, acting as a bystander for patients who have no-one to look after them and who would not be admitted otherwise – feeding them, washing them, getting their medicines, tending their wounds and so on. Nothing phases him, however disgusting (and, since some of his patients are incontinent, it does get very disgusting at times). For the neediest patients this can involve 24/7 care, in which case Shibu sleeps under their bed. He has an excellent reputation with the nursing staff, who will often alert him to other needs in the hospital

which we do our best to meet. For all this he receives no pay, just his board and lodging and, more recently, a small allowance. He is truly inspirational!

Shibu's wonderful work in the hospital has finally been recognised officially with an award.

Money for Selvi

Whilst a lot of our work in India is done on our behalf by Philip at The Banyan Tree, another, increasingly important, person who works for us is Pastor Wilson, who has his own NGO (charity) BGM. The credit unions, tailoring training and provision of sewing machines that we have written about in previous issues of *Tidings* are part of his work. In many ways he is like Tom – large numbers of people come to him in distress of all kinds, and he does what he can to comfort them and meet their needs. Your gifts through HHI provide much of the financial support that he gives.

We have been able to continue paying about half the cost of operations for needy people at the rate of one a month, but there have been more people needing operations than this, and a backlog built up. So we were delighted to receive a bequest recently, which has enabled us to clear the backlog

– two hysterectomies, injections to improve eyesight (yes, they do work!), medical treatment for severe scalding, and a second operation for a cancerous growth in the brain for Solomon (see August 2024 *Tidings* for the first). And a wonderfully generous supporter has paid for the rest of Rejulal's and Selvi's medical expenses (see *Tidings*, December 2024).

A few months ago Wilson told us about Saraswathi, a widow with two children at school. The death of her husband had left her destitute, as they had had to sell their cow in order to pay for his medical bills. We were able to use the money you gave us through the Alternative Gift Catalogue to buy her a replacement cow, ensuring that the family has an income and that the children can continue studying – the sale of milk from one cow will support the family nicely. Pastor Wilson tells us that she cried with pleasure!

We all know about climate change. In India, it means that the monsoon, on which agriculture depends, has become very unpredictable. Some years it is too weak, but this year it was too violent and a number of homes were seriously damaged. We were able to send out some money to meet immediate needs, but we would like to do more.

Recently, problems have arisen with sending money to Wilson. We have found a solution – please pray that this will continue to work well. And please pray for a good recovery for all the people that we are able to help.

Labour Day Awards

May 1st is Labour Day in Zambia and a public holiday. It is also a day when organisations recommend one or two of their employees for an award to recognise their commitment and hard work during the year.

Health Help Zambia has 8 employees and this year the awards were given to Alistair Mweete and John Mwansa.

Long time supporters of HHI will know that Alistair has been part of the HHZ team since its inception. She fondly recalls Ron Prosser's visits to Monze. Alistair has limited mobility as she was born with only one leg. She uses an artificial limb, which has given her a practical understanding of the problems which arise with disability. She is an excellent seamstress and teacher, and is committed to delivering the Menstrual Hygiene outreach programme. Alistair is often seen counselling disabled people who are waiting to see Brenda, the HHZ administrator. Her Labour Day award is well deserved, and we really do appreciate having such a talented lady delivering the work on behalf of our UK supporters.

John Mwansa started his work in the HHZ compound as a security guard. He has always been very helpful and courteous to the disabled and vulnerable people who come seeking assistance. He looks after the vegetables which are growing in the compound, ensures the premises are clean and tidy and does whatever needs doing. In 2024 HHZ needed a driver, and it was proposed that John could fill this role. HHIUK funded his driving course, he passed his test, and he is now a reliable, careful driver. Roads in Zambia are not good. They can be flooded or extremely dry with enormous potholes. John drives the HHZ vehicle regularly and safely, taking the Menstrual Hygiene team on their outreach programme; delivering sacks of mealie-meal to vulnerable people as part of the feeding programme; and taking the sewing tables to the newly qualified seamstresses. No task is too big for John. He is dependable and hard working. We give thanks for his loyalty and commitment to HHZ. Our heartfelt congratulations go to both Alistair and John for their well-deserved awards. HHI couldn't manage without you.

As you can see from the pictures the four disabled trainee seamstresses have graduated and received their new sewing machines. Alistair and Primeldah, the two HHZ seamstresses, did a fantastic job in training the four ladies to become proficient. They were beautifully cared for and befriended by the HHZ staff during their three months' stay in the HHZ compound. The four ladies - Mona, Abigail, Mainza and Florida - have now been safely returned to their villages to start using their new skills to income generate and support themselves.

They were also given some start-up capital by HHZ to buy fabric and cotton. Funding was also given by HHIUK to enable Robbie, the HHZ carpenter, to make four sturdy tables and stools which have also been delivered to the ladies' homes. The sewing machines are safely secured on the tables, and the ladies can sit comfortably to sew.

Alistair and Primeldah will continue to support the ladies to ensure their machines are maintained and in good working order. The HHZ reports received to date state that Alistair is very pleased with how the seamstresses are progressing in their new ventures. We offer a prayer of thanks for the four lives which have been turned around because of your funding.

Scotland: Strathaven Cafe Bridge

Strathaven Friends of HHI's third Cafe Bridge Day in aid of Health Help International was again a great success, drawing bridge players from around Scotland and including a party of fourteen from London. Not just raising funds for Health Help International it spreads word about the Charity far and wide and hopefully gains a few more supporters.





The first Cafe Bridge Day was held about ten years ago but they are gaining in popularity among the bridge fraternity and this year the enthusiasts have a choice of forty towns and villages throughout the UK in which to take part in one.

The players move around between selected cafes and restaurants and

play a few hands in each enjoying their local produce and having lunch in one of them half way round.

This year Strathaven offered seven venues, all with easy walking distance between them, and with fine weather on the day the visitors to the town had the opportunity of calling in at some of the bakers and other interesting gift shops which Strathaven has to offer.

SFHHI receives many complimentary comments from the bridge players about the way in which its event is organised and also about Strathaven itself.

The raffle was again very successful adding £374 to the amount raised from the bridge.



Following the bridge, a musical evening was presented for the bridge players who wished to attend and for the local supporters of SFHHI. Strathaven is fortunate in having lots of talented musicians and singers in the community and this year's programme included five solo performers and musical groups who provided a wide ranging musical treat to an appreciative

audience. The Avendale Church, whose members support HHI in many ways, generously allowed SFHHI the use of the church both as a base for the Cafe Bridge and for the concert.

The monies raised from the two events came to an excellent total of £2,200.



PLEASED TO REPORT . . .

In Zambia

Since April this year

- 23 disabled students have been funded into full time special-needs education;
- 1257 reusable sanitary packs have been given out to teenage girls in schools: and
- 15 wheelchairs have been repaired, and 10 new wheelchairs have been issued, along with Zimmers, crutches and walking frames.

In India

- In the last year HHI has trained 40 Indian women in tailoring and has helped 12 Indian women to buy sewing machines, lifting themselves and their families out of poverty;
- HHI supports 80 people with the cost of regular medication as well as many more with one-off payments for medical treatment; and
- Over 100 children with special needs receive physiotherapy, training and education at our two special-needs schools.
